Guest Speaker: Paul Doscher

Fishing the spring creeks of Yellowstone Valley north of the National Parks

Paul is currently visiting New Zealand and has offered to do a presentation for us. He is a long-time volunteer with Trout Unlimited in the US having had involvement in every part of the organisation from helping run youth education in his local chapter to serving on the national board of trustees. He has led an effort to engage Trout Unlimited members in developing collaborations with land trusts to protect important cold water streams and their watersheds.

Paul will also do a presentation for the March Meeting on the eastern American forest, European settlement and the impact on streams and cold water fisheries

President's Page

I hope that the Christmas break treated you and your families well, and the New Year is off to a good start. I am never overly hopeful of good fishing over Christmas, with crowds of people about and the weather not particularly settled. And so it proved this year; but time spent with family is the most important aspect of Christmas anyway.

What struck me on our trip, which went as far as Wanaka; is just how poorly anglers are treated (or are prepared to accept) in terms of access for their sport. While we see growth in resources such as mountain biking parks and bike trails catering for a range of biking skills, I found prime fishing areas either locked off (Deans Bank, Upper Clutha), disrupted by picnickers and campers, or spoiled by jet boaters showing off in shallow waters (Paddock Bay, Lake Wanaka). Clearly resources must be shared, but perhaps we should be pushing harder for at least some areas to be reserved for anglers, or boats travelling at under 5 knots.

The debate on the cycle track along the upper OretiRiver is a case in point: 'Fish and Game's concern is that the cycle trail goes through the upper Oreti River and the Oreti Fishery, and that the cycleway would negatively impact the brown trout fishery.' (Report from Stuff in 2016). I don't have any first hand reports on how this particular situation is panning out, but clearly the trend is one way only; more anglers sharing fewer resources.

Another observation was the number of anglers using spinning rods on the fly only section of the Upper Clutha. Perhaps that's just a holiday period issue...

With those points in mind, I am very interested in hearing our next speaker in February and March. Paul Doscher, a visitor from the US and member of Trout Unlimited, has offered to make two presentations to the Club. Paul led an effort to engage Trout Unlimited members in developing collaborations with land trusts to protect important cold water streams and their watersheds.

In February, Paul will talk about fishing in the world famous spring creeks of the Yellowstone valley north of Yellowstone National Park. He is happy to discuss both fishing and other information about the Park.

The March presentation will illustrate the history of the eastern American forest, how it was dramatically changed by European settlement, and the devastating impact it has had on fisheries. I think that many of us can relate to that, but of particular interest is how today they are working to restore those streams and recreate vibrant cold water fisheries.

I hope to see a good turnout, because I think we have much to learn.

FICKLE MANAWATU RAINBOWS

A visit from my brother from overseas over the Christmas period, seemed to be a good excuse to organise a few days flyfishing. We had fished the Mohaka on his last trip which had been reasonably successful and this appeared to be the obvious choice for this new adventure.

The night before we were due to leave, we received a call from one of our very active club members who was in the Mohaka area and found it to be high and coloured due to rain the previous night. As we had intended leaving early in the morning and fishing the Mohaka in the afternoon, we decided to change our plans and visit the Manawatu on the way up. I had fished it regularly many years ago but one of my favourite spots suffered significantly from a flood event and the main pools in that area have not been productive in recent years.

However the stretch of river we intended fishing was very close to the main road so we thought it was worth an hour or two to fill in time on the way further north.

Arriving at the river it looked in excellent condition and the pools which I'd fished many years ago all appeared to be back as they were. Our nymphs were soon exploring the likely runs but we very quickly noticed that the water was extremely warm and although the runs looked promising, I was not too hopeful due to the water temperature.

The first couple of runs produced one fish each which at least got us on our way and I then decided to make for what had previously been my favourite pool on the Manawatu and found it much as I remembered it from years ago.

My brother's first cast produced a feisty 1½ lb rainbow followed in quick succession by another and another. I had hardly got my line in the water by this stage but my brother was having an excellent time. We continued with the nymphs fishing the run into the pool and the rainbows (and one brown) continued to love them.

Just for something different a green woolly bugger swung across the current was successful which showed that the fish were not over fussy. All the fish were in excellent condition and fought very well considering the water temperature.

After an hour and a half we decided it was time to head north and at this stage the pool had produced 13 fish and we had only moved 25 metres. A few more fish on the woolly bugger on the way back to the car gave us 19 for the morning, all of which had been returned to fight another day.

The next morning the Mohaka was its usual beautiful self but fish were hard to come by. The lower reaches were still quite coloured. Two days of fishing produced only a few mainly small but feisty fish but the Mohaka scenery always makes it all worthwhile.

Two weeks later we were again in the Manawatu region so we headed back to the pool which had been so successful earlier. The river had dropped a few inches due to the fine weather over the New Year and there were footprints in the

sand indicating others had also found the spot. Although the water still looked nice and deep there was not the same force to create the turbulence and resulting oxygen which was apparent on the previous visit and after half an hour of fishing we had nothing to show for our efforts. Making our way back to the car however the green woolly bugger swung through any oxygenated rapidy runs were rewarded with 7 excellent fish all between 2 and 3½ lb. It was the oxygen they were after. The second trip was also late in the afternoon whereas the previous time it was early morning and no doubt this also played a part in the change of location of the fish on the second time round.

As the summer progresses and I assume the Manawatu will get even lower, the rapidy runs will become the focus point of any future trips to the area this year.
