PRESIDENTS REPORT

Christmas and New Year holidays are now over for most of us and we are now back to fitting in our fishing trips into the weekends. In our previous magazine I commented on the excellent early season fishing in all our rivers and there certainly been some excellent weather. Stories of great fishing have continued to come from numerous anglers especially on the local front but the excellent weather has a two edged sword. Most rivers in our region are now suffering from low water flows and warm temperature. Once the water temperature gets above 19 to 20 degrees fish are not so active feeders and are looking for oxygenated water and deeper pools. Mid-morning fishing before the sun has had a chance to increase the water temperature seems to be the best bet.

The cicada season is now well and truly apparent out on our local rivers and our last On Stream day saw 13 fish come to the fly. It is important to make sure your cicada flies are not over-dressed and there is plenty of space in the gape of the hook. Of the 13 fish that rose to the cicada on the On Stream day only 6 were finally netted with most being lost in the first few seconds. Make sure your hooks are also nice and sharp. The cicada season should last a few more weeks so give it a go.

FICKLE RAINBOWS

Rainbow trout have always been regarded as easier to catch than the more elusive brown trout. Their more aggressive nature, especially during the spawning season when they will snap at anything coming within their domain, makes the rainbow a prime target for novice anglers. For this very reason the Capital Trout Centre and other children's fishing ponds throughout the country, are all stocked with rainbow trout on the basis they are easier to catch.

However, recent experiences at the Capital Trout Centre shows that they can still be very discerning especially when it comes to their food.

For the last twenty years the Capital Trout Centre has been using a particular type of food pellet which sinks reasonably easily and is easy to imitate with a range of small dark flies. This year however the Trout Centre was offered a significant amount of food from King Salmon at no cost which was of significant benefit to the Centre. However unlike the previous food, this food was dehydrated and after one or two hesitant days, the rainbows put on a spectacular surface display each time they were fed. While the visual effect excites the children who visit the Centre on our various events, and is also a welcome supplement to the diet of the many ducks which now inhabit the pond, trying to create a fly which imitates the food pellet floating on the surface has proved extremely difficult. Soaking the dehydrated food overnight, enables much of it to now sink but the fish are still very particular about which fly they are prepared to accept.

Last week we had a shipment of 450 rainbows from the Turangi hatchery which were duly delivered using the

Ngongotaha tanker which keeps the water temperatures somewhat cooler than the 19 degrees they faced when discharged into our pond.

Not surprisingly therefore, the first few days showed very little activity while they recovered from this ordeal but it was not long before these trout were also fixated on the new food and provided a challenge for our club members on the Open Day held on the 17th February. No doubt those anglers who regularly visit the pond and assist with the various events will be matching their flytying techniques in an attempt to produce the secret fly the trout will be unable to resist. The next few events at the pond should be very interesting.

POND GETS NEW OXYGENATION UNIT

Prior to the 2017/2018 season the Wellington City Council built us an oxygenation unit from an old pump found at the tip and some suitable pipe work. This was gratefully received and had an immediate effect on the fish activity in the pond especially during the hot summer days.

Unfortunately the pump which had been sent to the tip on the basis that it had reached its final days, finally gave up working at the end of the season but in the meantime had encouraged us to persevere with the idea of an oxygenation unit to supplement the pond's oxygen levels

With the hot summer this year, we again tried to get the pump working but a new club member, Ken Clarke, who has some considerable experience in pump maintenance, pronounced it well and truly dead.

Ken however was able to procure a pump which is specially designed for the purpose and spent some time ensuring that the whole system worked properly.

The effect on the pond has been quite dramatic and both the club members and the rainbows send him our sincere thanks for the time and effort he's put into this operation

Club competition

The annual competition for the Club's fishing trophy is to be held on the Ruamahanga River on Saturday 9 March. This has always been a friendly affair and closely contested by a few keen anglers. The competition is not restricted to experienced anglers however, and less confident anglers are welcome to join. If we get enough competitors, we will run a handicap competition in addition to the Club Cup.

Anglers are paired together and take turns to fish. Where possible we pair the less experienced anglers with the experienced anglers. This way they have the opportunity to pick up on a few ideas from the experienced anglers.

There are some good numbers of fish in the Ruamahanga. The Sports Fly Fishing NZ Wellington Regional was held there on 12 January. For the day, six anglers caught 40 trout. The average catch rate was just under one fish per hour, and average size 37cm long. The largest fish, rainbow and brown, measured 50cm each.

The fishing got tough in the later sessions as in those competitions every beat gets fished over three times. (If you draw a beat that a top angler fished in the previous session, it can be very tough.)

For the Club competition however we try to allow every angler to fish fresh water. That will depend on numbers of competitors and conditions on the day.

Full competition details will be sent to competitors before the competition. Note: the competition rules are to meet Fish & Game regulations only, i.e. competitors do not have to conform to Sports Fly Fishing NZ rules, or provide a controller.

Gold (Black) Bead Hare & Copper Nymph

This is arguably New Zealand's greatest contribution to fly design. It is the easiest pattern to tie in its most simple form yet it is one of the most effective nymph designs. Tied "in the round" so it looks the same no matter how it is drifting.

A perfect starting place for anyone thinking about giving flytying a go.

Larger examples probably suggest large swimming mayflies, bullies and stoneflies.

medium sizes suggest caddis pupae and small ones midge pupae.
