How we spent 2 weeks in the South Island caught (almost) nothing!

Two retired professors, members of the WFC, spent just over two weeks in late February and early March in the South Island. This trip was billed to family and friends as a CP trip- ie Casting practice. This was done so as not to raise expectations about catching fish.

We started with a ferry crossing from Wellington to Picton on a gorgeous, still clear morning. In fact the entire trip was blessed with unbelievably gorgeous weather throughout. As we lined up to drive on to the ferry, we were struck by the number of camper vans joining the trip – about 110 as best we could count. More later.

First stop was the Motueka. We stayed at a B&B called Doone Cottage about 26km south of Motueka, or some 15 km north of Tapawera. The B&B can be strongly recommended as can the pub meals at Tapawera. Sadly three January floods had scoured at the river and it was still recovering. So no fish!

However a lesson was learnt (experience is what you get after you need it). One of us decided that fishing the evening rise would be a good idea and waded out into a likely spot just below the confluence with the Pearse River. Standing in knee-deep water our intrepid fisher sent his line crashing on to the water vaguely in the direction of suspected rises (his casting is normally described as the equivalent of throwing a 2kg rock into the pool). As dusk fell, our fisher sensibly decided to head back before it got much darker. When he turned to start the trek back, the light had faded to the point that the river looked black – absolutely no view of the bottom. After several attempts to pick his way back along the route he had taken, it became apparent this was not working. This was reinforced by the time he was up to his neck in water and the bottom disappearing from under him. So it was swim time – with heavy wading boots, a large pack and carrying a rod, a 30 metre swim partly against the current was a challenge. The good news - an exhausted fisher eventually crawled on to the bank, the \$124 he had spent on a waterproof/shockproof case for his expensive cell phone performed admirably and BMW makes waterproof car keys.

Then it was on to the West Coast – Murchison, Greymouth, Franz Joseph and Haast. It became quickly apparent that most of the rivers are big and boisterous and one needed much more detailed information about access points than could be gleaned from the library of fishing guides to the South Is that we carried.

A slight digression: at the AGM of the Lake Tarawera Ratepayers' Association in January, the Rotorua mayor, Steve Chadwick spoke of the issue of freedom camping and cited a figure of 66,000 campervans on the road in New Zealand



at any one time in the peak months. We treated this number with some scepticism – it seemed incredibly large. But after travelling in the South Island our impression was it could be an underestimate.

Every time we found a reasonably accessible spot on a river, there would be 20 or 30 vans parked there- and swimmers, dogs and kayaks gambolling in the



very water we had hoped to fish. Campervans were everywhere – in their hundreds – even in the remotest places.

So we pushed on to Gore and based ourselves there for 3 days. Surely the Mataura would yield an odd fish or three. Vain hope. (We did wonder if the District Council might be sued for false advertising).

We visited spots covering 60km of the river – and the place was crawling with fishers. A guide told us that he

was fully booked now for 2 years out – foreign visitors flood the area in the peak months. He advised us of many places not to bother with as the water was being flogged by the hordes. But there are stunning areas – Cattle Flat in particular.

So off to Dunedin and the Taieri River – lots of good water especially above Middlemarch. The water was crystal clear and 20cm deep typically. The young browns were evident but despite our stealth, the sight of a line sent then scampering like the demented teenagers they were. A trip to Loganburn Resevoir was abandoned after the wind whipped up 1m high waves.

A stop on Lake Lyndon was next where the temperature dropped to less than 3 deg C with a 20 knot wind. Frozen inoperative fingers ended our fruitless casting after an hour. And on to St Arnaud. With the Kaikoura road closed all traffic from Picton south is headed to Blenheim, St Arnaud, Murchison and on. The excess burden of heavy traffic is creating havoc with traffic and with the road. There are maintenance crews working on the road every 10kms, creating unavoidable delays. And literally hundreds of road workers have all the camp grounds and many motels booked out for months. Accommodation in Murchison was almost impossible to find.



combed at the start of the expedition. And our trip ended with 6 good browns on #18 Passion vine hoppers microscopic nymphs (barely visible to ageing eye). Another two decided to leave as they approached the net and were classified as LDRs – long distance releases.

What did we learn:

 Detailed local knowledge is invaluable – going to new areas without it, is not a Finally, at this point decided that if we were to catch an elusive South Island brown we needed grown up help. For this we hired a guide and it was with some relief that we found he had a cottage on his property in St Arnaud and could include accommodation. So off back to the Motueka with guide John Gendall—to the very areas in fact we had

ON-STREAM DAY

Next onstream day – Sunday 21st

The On-Stream Day will be on the Hutt River, weather permitting. On-stream days are opportunities for members who are new to flyfishing to learn from an experienced angler. Attendance at one or two on-stream days will help in gaining an understanding of fishing rivers. Develop rudimentary casting skills at our Hataitai Park sessions before coming to an on-stream day. It is your responsibility to have a current NZ sports fishing licence. These can be purchased from Hunting & Fishing, 444 Cuba St Alicetown, or online from Fish & Game.

Contact Strato (386-3740) before 9pm on the Wednesday prior to get details of where to meet. Limited numbers can be accommodated and acceptance will be on a first come first served basis.

FISH'N TIPS



New Zealand trout live in an environment with no large mammalian or avian predators. Hence, unlike in Europe or America where bears, eagles and other predators will take unwary fish in the shallows, NZ trout can be found in the shallowest water during the day rather than hiding in deep pools. When approaching a stream begin searching for fish at casting distance away from the bank rather than walking up to the water's edge. Fish the waters edge before moving closer to fish the far bank.

ECHO RODS

A new range of both single-handed and two-handed rods are now available in New Zealand.

Designed and built in the USA they are the work of Jim Rajeff, an experienced and successful competition fly caster.

Jeff Wood has access to some of these rods and will be holding a rod demonstration on Belmont Domain at 10 am on Sunday 30th April. If you would like to attend the demonstration, please contact Jeff on 021-204-8978 beforehand.

You will need your fishing licence as part of the demonstration will take place on the water.





Feather Merchants Fly of the Month

Taupo "Bombs"

Having an effective heavy nymph can be the difference between getting your presentation into the "hot zone" where fish are - or casting practice.

Casting heavy nymphs is another thing so working on your casting skills will definitely pay off.

Hook TMC 5262 size 10 or larger

Thread Black 3/0 or 6/0

Weight Tungsten beads and lead wire Tail Hackle fibres or yarn (optional)

Body Dubbed fur or wire

If anyone has suggestions for fly patterns they would like to see tied at the flytying meetings please let Gordon know 027 494 6487. This will give an opportunity to plan ahead and order materials well in advance.
