

PRESIDENT'S PAGE

I was looking forward to spending time on the river over Queen's Birthday weekend. It had been a while since I had been in Turangi, so sharing the river with a crowd of others wasn't going to stop me. Unfortunately, Covid-19 did. A positive RAT on Friday settled any doubts. It also ruled out catching up friends at Turangi the following weekend. There was no way I was going to be healthy enough for both the drive and time on the river. The only positive was that I missed the floods that occurred, and had time to tie a good number of flies suitable for the Taupo rivers.

With a little luck Matariki might be good to me. I suspect my time on the river might still be limited, but it will good to stretch the legs.

I joined the Club fly-tying group on Monday evening. There was a good turnout with all the seats occupied. I found trying to explain the various steps in tying a tungsten bead nymph on a jig head challenging when the number of people there meant that they couldn't all see the fly I had on my vice. Nevertheless, people were patient, and there were some good flies created. I was asked for the name of the pattern I was demonstrating and the flies I showed them that I had tied while having Covid. The only flies I could perhaps ascribe a name to were the white caddis nymphs. I think the key message was that as long as the fly meets a few basics such as weight, shape, colour contrast and is not over dressed, i.e. sinks well enough, then it can catch fish in the Taupo rivers.

At the time of writing, we have not confirmed our speaker for the next Club meeting. Our back-up will be to run a workshop, covering various aspects of preparation for fly fishing and care of equipment. We still have some options we are following up on though, so do come along.

WHAT FLY TO USE - Which Fly Is Best

At the last fly tying night, a full table of fly tiers showed up in very cold conditions.

We had invited Paul Baker, our president, to show us the basics of the nymphs that he ties, not only for the Taupo area but also for general use. We were also to have a quick demonstration on how easy it is to tie a glow bug.

Paul had two of his nymphs on display and he took us through the fundamentals that he sees as being prerequisites in what makes a good fly.

First and foremost he was asked the name of the fly and it soon became apparent that this was rather irrelevant as a fly with a wellknown name is no better than any other if it's not tied correctly.

First and foremost, the fly that you are tying should represent a food item that the fish recognise which may vary depending on the time of year and the availability of that food item in the wild.

The fly should have a number of fundamental characteristics.

- a) It should roughly be the same size and shape of the natural. Too often flies are tied with too much dubbing and are overdressed. The length of the fly is also an important factor.
- b) The weight of the fly. This will very much depend on the water you are fishing and the time of year. Fishing the Taupo rivers in the winter time, depth is extremely important and adding enough weight to the fly to get down

to the trout who are making their spawning journey is critical to success. Adding a tungsten bead to the head of the fly can also be supplemented with a small amount of lead along the shank. This heavy fly can be used to take a much lighter one to the bottom.

Paul likes to use jig hooks which turn upside down and do not catch as much rubbish on the bottom.

- c) Getting the trout's attention is a key factor .not only in respect to the colour of the materials you are using but also the use of materials that sparkle and catch the trout's eye.
- d) Next and by no means least is to ensure that you have some movement in the fly with the use of soft hackles.

It is of course possible for flies to be produced in plastic that exactly imitate particular food items, however they lack one fundamental ingredient and that is movement.

The fly that Paul tied for us incorporated all the above ingredients and should be a winner for all those who attended.

And it has no name.

Orange Rabbit

Some lures are essential for the central Plateau. Along with Red Setter, Craig's Night Time, Smelt, Woolly Bugger and Glow Bug – Orange Rabbit completes the

basic selection. An easy pattern to tie that works particularly well in Taupo's rivers.

Hook	TMC 5262 size 2 – 10
Thread	Black Mono
Tail	Orange hackle fibres
Rib	Silver oval tinsel
Body	Orange Chenille
Wing	Natural or grey rabbit fur strip
Hackle	Natural or grey hackle.

Instructions

- Tie in thread at bend
- Tie in orange tail fibres to the bend
- Tie in tinsel at bend and let hang
- Tie in orange chenille at bend and wrap thread to head, then wrap chenille to head.
- Trim rabbit skin at front end to a point.
- Tie in pointed end of rabbit at head
- Wrap tinsel over rabbit to head (3 wraps) trying not to catch fur and tie off behind head.
- Tie in brown hackle feather at head and wrap 2 or 3 times.
- Tie off.

A TRIP WITH FOUR ANGLERS...

Was it the recent wellington "weather bomb" that sent four anglers to go fly fishing?

A trip with four anglers had planned to go fly fishing midweek during mid-June 2022, staying at the Patangata Hastings Angling Club accommodation.

Rain, thunder and lightning were howling across the lower North Island. Did we really want to go trout fishing? Of course, why not?

The introductory photos supplied showed a clear sky and clear fishing water, so the intrepid four set off!

Coming north through Woodville, there were signs a better weather ahead, as even the sky had a bright light shining, called the sun.

Some of us arrived Sunday evening, with the rest arriving about lunchtime on the Monday 13 June.

So what were the conditions?

While the weather was good the rivers were unfishable, except any spring creeks.

The Tukituki River was close to bank to bank, and later became bank to bank; the Waipawa River had some new streams, when inspected at Walkers Road, on our first day of scouting around for fishable water. Both rivers had that light brown, khaki look, that we all know suggests

"not fishable".

Tuesday morning, our first day fishing, was when we discovered the Mangaonuku Stream, which was clear with no wind. Fishing here was a good omen with Jeannie hooking into the first trout about 10:00am. Maurice had a hook up soon after.



Grant and Lindsay helped bring the tally to 12 for Day One.

Later we partook of smoked trout, crackers and cucumber with salmon and a 27-year-old Pinot Noir. The disintegrating cork took some kiwi ingenuity to filer it.





This was also accompanied by Jeannie's banana cake. Similar snacks were enjoyed each night.

As a novice fisherwoman Jeannie appreciated all the advice Maurice provided about where to fish and how to set up her rig. This meant Jeannie managed to hook into a second trout.

Wednesday and Thursday's fishing while not fully as successful, still allowed us to add to our trip tally. Thanks to Grant for two more trout.

Now this technique employed needs to be explained:

Pull out about 12 hoops of flyline from the reel and let it rest on the ground at your feet;

Cast out, mend and then feed out most of this excess flyline with the "wiggle effect";

This "wiggle effect" means wiggling your rod quickly side to side to let the flyline have a good drift down stream;

Keep allowing more flyline out until there at least 10 metres drifting downstream;

Let the flyline rest at the end of the drift for at least 10 seconds and then the line starts to jerk and see a trout has taken the drifting fly.

Really good to use when the water is clear and you may be afraid you are seen by the trout.

We all kept looking at the countryside as we drove to the Tutaekuri River, at the Lower Flag Road access point. This short stop-over was on our way to the Mangaonuku Stream. We just took a small detour, well maybe a long detour! Yes, we all believe this, as the angler's truth! It was high, dirty, uncrossable and unfishable.



It was Friday morning as we packed our vehicles in overcast conditions and just as we had finished the clean-up, had the cars packed it started raining again...Seems time to go home and Maurice can plan for more future trips and others can let him know they also want to come along.

I am writing to ask for support from your club for a project of the Kapiti Fly Fishing Club - Kapiti Women on The Fly.

In 2021, my husband and I joined the Kapiti Fly Fishing Club and after being elected to the committee, Kapiti Women on The Fly was initiated to get more women involved in fly fishing locally.

The goals of Kapiti Women on The Fly are to:

- To grow female club membership and encourage more female participation in fly fishing in the wider Wellington region,
- Build a support group for current and inspiring female anglers, where women can make friends, gain confidence, and learn skills.
- To raise the profile of fly fishing as a healthy outdoor activity for women that has proven positive effects on mental health and wellbeing.

Growth has been organic to date including:

- A virtual network of women in our region who fish, or who would like to fish.
- Casting lessons and on-river events (with support from club members Gordon Baker & Michael Murphy).
- An inaugural trip to Turangi, with two further trips planned for June & July.
- Relationships with other female anglers across New Zealand, in particular with the Taupo Club members and the NZ Fly Ferns.

Early on, Wellington Fish & Game staff indicated their support for these activities. Last week I attended the Wgtn F&G meeting, where we received positive support from the council.
