

If anyone has suggestions for fly patterns they would like to see tied at the fly-tying meetings please let Strato know (386 3740).




## **GREAT BOOKS ABOUT FLY**

## FISHING # 1

Mark Wormald: The Catch. Fishing for Ted Hughes. Bloomsbury Circus, London, 2022. 323 p.

My first review for Tight Lines is about a book from "Home", because it was England that provided New Zealand with the first deliveries of frozen eggs for the introduction of brown trout, rainbow trout and salmon. Without that service, there would be no salmonids in our country— and probably not a Fly Fishing Club.



The Catch is a fascinating book. It is devoted to the famous English poet laureate Ted Hughes (1930-1998) whose life was dominated by poetry and fly fishing. For him, the passion to pursue, capture, kill and eat was and still is contained in us as the old hunting instinct, the bodily need to hunt. For Ted, the activity in which it survives in its purest form, the passion and excitement, was fishing. He was born in the county of Devon in Southwest England, close to the River Taw, where he learned the art of fly fishing as a child. He later declared the Taw as his "Own River". He originally lived in the West Dartland of Torridge, but his passion for fish and fishing took him restlessly and for all his life to places where he could find new fishing grounds, wild fish and real water. He lived a colourful life which was governed by his poetry and fish. His family shared this passion with him.

Ted extensively travelled and guided his family to ever new targets, to streams, rivers, lakes, loughs, even reservoirs, always on the

pursuit for trout, sea trout and salmon. He loved the fishing waters in Scotland, Ireland, Austria, but even went as far as Iceland and Alaska. Fishing was his way of breathing. He needed to fish, it sustained him. It took him into the natural world, and reminded him of who he was, who he had been.

With all his accumulated wisdom, he never wrote a book about his fishing experiences. He was a poet, and all his love went into his poems. When he finally composed a book about fishing, it was a book of poems, aptly called River, published in 1983. All his love for fishing went into his poems. He had kept them for a long time by himself and when he finally made his collection public, it became the most poetic book that ever had been written about fish and fishing. But it was certainly not a very popular book. It was a deftly and passionately attentive chronicle of life, nature and the change over the course of the seasons. It is important to note that the fish which Ted had caught in all these waters was destined for him and his family's consumption. Ted's nickname was "predator". He was not only a master fisherman, but also a good cook. He knew what to do with the catch. His favorite dish for breakfast was smoked salmon. Catch and release, the now ever growing "fishing for fun" was unknown in his generation. Fish were only released if they were too big or too small or ill.

Ted met Mark Wormald, the author of this book, at the University of Cambridge in 1983. As it quickly turned out, Mark was also a poet and keen fisherman, and this first encounter developed into an intimate partnership and friendship. The then young poet and fisherman became an apprentice and Ted the teacher. They travelled and fished together, and the aging Ted let him know all the subtleties of fly fishing for trout and salmon. And Mark would become more and more familiar with Ted's angling philosophy.

"For the angler who lives near a river, the state of the water becomes the first thing he speaks of each day. He watches it as the doctor watches a patient's temperature chart".

"I do not talk about catching a fish. It's about your sense of the fish and the river catching the fisherman".

After Ted's death, Mark discovered that Ted had entrusted all his papers into the care of the Manuscript Department of the British Library. For weeks and weeks, Mark had been seen reading and copying Ted' voluminous unpublished folders of letters, diaries, fishing and travel reports and his views on life and nature. This was a real treasure for him and he used all the new knowledge about Ted's earlier life to walk in the foot steps of his deceased friend. He travelled extensively with both his own and Ted's family, very often coming to places where Ted had left his marks. But he also became more and more aware of the impact of the radical progress of civilization onto the fishing waters. He saw and regretted the effects of industrial pollution, road constructions, bridges, water abstraction, algae blooming, you name it... He was an active member of the Trout Association Water Resources Group and the Atlantic Salmon Trust.

The book needs deep reading, and I recommend doing it one chapter a day and to let it sink in. Mark's beautiful, inspirational language is stunning, so are the inviting titles of the book chapters like Stealing Trout, I fished Still Waters, Headwaters, The Catch, Great Irish Pike, the Dry-Fly Purist, May Salmon, and much more. And you will find only a few pages of this book without the mentioning of fish or fishing. You might also find some humour as well:

A man can match
The hatch and catch
The Time of his life
In fish and in wife,
But live forever
He will never
Land the river

And you might follow the "predator's" slogan: Fish on!
