PRESIDENT'S PAGE

1st of October is a special moment in our angling calendar.

It is a chance to fish many of the streams that have been closed during the winter spawning season. A chance to re-evaluate the damage caused by the storm events of earlier in the year in terms not only of fish survival but also the environmental impact.

It is also a reminder that the 1st of October is the beginning of a new fishing year and you must have a new Fish & Game licence for the lakes and rivers other than the Taupo Region.

This last month's club trip to the Manawatu gave us an opportunity to check on the condition of one of our close fishing destinations. Local anglers we met confirmed that the river had been heavily fished by anglers from outside of the region whose own local fishing destinations have been destroyed by the storm events earlier in the year.

Nevertheless those on the club trip found pockets of fish with over twenty being hooked on the Friday afternoon and Saturday.

By late Saturday afternoon however the weather had deteriorated badly with strong winds and by Sunday conditions made fishing virtually impossible.

1st October this year falls on a Sunday and hopefully many of our club members will take the opportunity to wet a line on that day as part of tradition and we look forward to their tales to be told on the club night of 2nd October.

I have spent some time over recent weeks re-drafting the Wainuilomata access map and found that there had been significant changes with landowners passing away or selling some of their holdings.

In talking to owners it became very apparent that we need to remember that the Wainuiomata River has very few places other than the regional park areas where access is automatically available. In my discussion with the owners there appeared to be very little resentment towards fly fishermen but in virtually all cases the owners preferred to receive a call asking for permission rather than anglers simply walking over private property either to reach the river or fish along the river simply because they've done so in the past.

A thank you at the end of a day's fishing on an owner's property goes a long way.

CLUB MEETING HELD ON MONDAY 4TH SEPTEMBER.

The storm which ravaged a number of parts of the North Island earlier this year created a great deal of damage to waterways and the surrounding areas. The effect on trout populations will become apparent during this next fishing season and on Monday night we were given a presentation from Matt Kavermann from Wellington Fish & Game. This was to give us a review of Fish & Game's up to date information of the fishable water within the Wellington, Taranaki and Hawkes Bay areas.

Matt's presentation relied mainly on the various web sites which are available. In most cases these gave detailed graphs in terms of water levels and turbidity and also web cams but as our meeting is held at night time the web cams which usually give a visual view of the rivers were of little use due to the darkness.

However many of the rivers showed signs of stable flows over recent weeks but the unknown factor was the turbidity resulting from the huge amounts of silt in the surrounding areas each time it rains.

Nevertheless we look forward to some good fishing over the coming months.

Matt also advised us of some access issues which were apparent on the Wainuiomata River, which hopefully can be resolved.

UPCOMING CLUB TRIPS

October 20/22 Manganui-a-te-ao (Camping Trip) weather permitting

The Manganui-a-te-ao ('the great stream of the land') has the dubious distinction of being the the only remaining Central Plateau river that's not been diverted into the Rangipo Hydro Scheme. River access and a free camping area are available at Ruatiti Domain. About 15km of river is accessible. About 4km north of Raetihi on SH4, turn left into Ohura Road and follow it for 8km to reach the river.

A WCO was passed in 1989 to protect in particular the endangered blue duck (whio) which has a preference for clean, fast-flowing streams in the forested upper catchments of New Zealand rivers. The Manganui o te Ao River catchment is one of eight sites identified in the National Whio Recovery Plan (2007) as a priority for whio (blue duck) management.



GREAT BOOKS ABOUT FLY

The Fly Fisher.

The Essence and Essentials of Fly Fishing.

Berlin, Gestalten Publishing, 2017. 258 p., Ill.

I am glad to present the members of the Wellington Fly Fishing Club this wonderful book. It is certainly an album which deserves a great number of superlatives: It might well be the largest book about



flyfishing (30 x 25 cm), an might also be the heaviest (1.6 kg); it certainly presents as beautiful. It was conceived, edited and designed by as much as 20 artists, photographers, printers and of course a number of excellent fly fishers from all around the world. The editor of Gestalten Publishing House in Berlin published it as a celebration of both the community and artistry of a sport with an ever-growing global appeal. It shows a refreshing overview on the essence of the sport, while showing great care for nature and connection with the environment. The book's message is in line with the spirit of Zane Grev as he wrote in Tales of the Southern Rivers in 1924: "If I fished only to capture fish, my fishing trips would have ended long ago". Fly fishing is much more than catching as many fish, or even as big a fish as possible; this book understands fly fishing as an activity that fosters closeness to nature. It attempts to picture the fly fisher with a lifelong passion and enthusiasm for our very special sport – one which is about to nature in all its diversity.

The first part of the book - comprising 91 pages, could be called a historical and pictorial overview of the art of fly fishing from the early Roman times to the present. Every chapter holds beautiful pictures showing historical and contemporary essentials about fly fishing like rods and knots, old spools and nowadays reels, a chapter about the Hardy Brothers, who founded the most famous tackle manufactury in

the world. This is followed by a large chapter about flies and fly tying, which leads you into a section of a pictorial review with hundreds of stunning pictures of beautiful flies. It comprises special chapters about mayflies, caddisflies, stoneflies. The final section is a very helpful introduction to the different ways of casting a line. At the end of this first part of the book, you will find a pictorial and biological description of most fish species which could be caught using a fly line. The first part of the album is a book in its own right, and as beautiful as it is, could be strongly recommended to any fly fishing novice looking for an introduction into this wonderful art of fishing.

The second part of this breathtaking album can only be described as pure bliss. The 131 beautiful full-scale pictures create a symphony of fly fishing all over the world. The fly fishers in situ were always accompanied by first class photographers. The top collection of 36 pictures is centered around the work of a group of young American fly fishers who all live in one of the planet's most enticing destinations, the province of Montana, with its hundreds of rivers at the West Coast and home of the golden trout. This is followed by a portrait of Maggie

Brenneman, a famous fishing guide and conservationist, born in Denver, Colorado. She has developed fly fishing in its finest form and has traveled the world as an ambassador for her passion, combining her outdoor activities with her care for nature. She is also known to be an excellent cook; whenever the has got a good catch, she will bring it back to the barbeque. Maggie has also visited some New Zealand rivers. She still recalls the moment at a small South Island river when she came face to face with two huge eels.

The remaining part of the book takes you to the finest fly fishing-destinations around the world. It consists of large number of chapters of various length. This part starts with taking you to the Tsimani River in Bolivia where they fish for the famous Golden Dorado. St. Brandon's Atholls in Mauritius also offer beautiful fly fishing opportunities. The Seychelle Islands provide unique salt water fly fishing adventures. In Tanzania, Africa, fishing is famous for the Tiger Fish, one of the most aggressive predators of the world. Florida's saltwater fishing for the Tarpon is extremely popular and spectacular. Japan is presented here because it has developed the Tencara method of fly fishing. The Pindus Mountains in Greece and Albania offer the fly fisher the rough valleys of the Vjora River. In Argentine, the best dry-fly fishing is to be had in the Valley of Rio Grande. Chile's fly fishing paradise is situated in Patagonia. Finally, the book recommends a wilderness voyage to fish the rivers of Kamchatka in Siberia.

Even if you have little chance to travel to these extraordinary destinations, you will certainly love that book for the most beautiful photographs which will help to picture the beauty of our great sport.

The book offers the E-mail addresses of all the photographers and artists who have contributed to this wonderful book.

The Fly Fisher is still available in second hand book shops or at gestalten publishing house Berlin at a prize between 20 and 48 EUR.

Lunker Buster

In the early days of my competitive fishing, I received great support from Roy Cotter, from Pahiatua, who not only assisted in suggesting suitable competition venues on the Manawatu River but supplied me with a number of flies. These included a pattern which he had developed himself which he had aptly named the Lunker Buster.

The word Lunker is an Americanism denoting a large fish and while it certainly catches its share of trophies, also works well on small browns and rainbows.



The fly has worked well for me on many occasions since that day either as a single fly or in a larger version used in tandem with a smaller nymph. The fly has also been very successful when tied as a larger pattern on 10's and 12's in lakes and large rivers fished as a dragonfly pattern or even swung downstream on a wet line and slowly retrieved.

I suspect my current version differs somewhat from Roy's original for which I apologise for still using his distinct name.

Hook	Kamisan B 175 #12 or #14
Tail	Pheasant tail fibres
Abdomen	Black tying thread
Rib	Copper wire
Thorax	Dubbed hare's fur with plenty of guard fibres over lead wire
Wing case	Pheasant tail fibres or Christmas tinsel for flash back

Tying Instructions

- Tie in 3 or 4 tail fibres no more than 10mm extending from the bend
- Tie in copper rib at bend
- Use the tying thread to create cigar shaped body from bend of the hook to 2/3 of the way up the shank.
- · Rib body with copper wire (three to four turns) and tie off.
- Tie in pheasant tail wing case so that the tippets are long enough to form the wing and also to be folded under to create legs.
- Wrap lead wire to form thorax and dub in hares fur.
- Fold wing case to the head and tie off but don't trim.
- · Fold wing case tippets under the body and tie off.
- Cement head.
