A recent club trip to the Ruamahunga made me really think what does constitute a successful days fishing.

Here in New Zealand fish in the 1-2 kilo range are caught consistently and our rivers and lakes can produce trout of significantly bigger sizes. However when one watches videos of trout fishing overseas and for those of us who have been lucky enough to experience trout fishing in some European countries, fish of around 200-300 grams are commonly targeted and in many cases these are adult fish.

Overseas anglers catching a number of these small fish on a fishing expedition deem it a success and we therefore need to stop and think occasionally of how privileged we are here in New Zealand.

Our recent trip to the Ruamahunga, which is reported elsewhere in the magazine, produced a large number of small fish, in this case juveniles, but on a beautiful day with easy and free access and with excellent water conditions it was still a very pleasant way of spending the day.

Upcoming trips and the winter spawning runs up the Lake Taupo rivers give us the opportunity to catch fish which many overseas anglers can only dream of but hopefully will be a rewarding time for club members.

We have asked the Ngongotaha Hatchery to deliver our annual shipment of 1000 rainbows one month earlier this year to try and avoid the hot temperatures of mid-summer.

As a result the pond clean-up will therefore be earlier than normal and will be held on the weekend of the 29th and 30th June.

LAST CAST

The Capital Trout Centre has had only three fish in the pond since mid January.

They have teased a couple of groups by rising to food and swimming around their flies but evading capture.

The anglers 'Last Cast' proved a charm for a ten year old angler, who was having casting lessons, when he was advised to have a last cast before going home. He hooked onto a 1.540kg rainbow and with advice to play the fish carefully, managed to bring it to the net.

On gutting the fish we marvelled at the fact that his stomach was absolutely full of food pellets but his greedy grab at one more pellet was his undoing.

CLUB ANNUAL FISHING COMPETITION

The annual competition for the Club's fishing trophy was held on the Ruamahanga River on Saturday 24 February. This has always been a friendly affair and closely contested by a few keen anglers. This year we had six entries, but one competitor woke up early Saturday morning feeling poorly, which resulted in an odd number of anglers. Because we fish in pairs, taking turns to fish or act as controller, we had to cut back to 4 anglers.

Strato kindly pulled out and helped draw the pairs and beats on the river before heading home. The first session had Paul & Brian paired to fish upstream from the Gladstone Bridge. As soon as we headed out on the river, we saw three fly fishers before us in the first pool; not an auspicious beginning. A polite conversation introducing ourselves and determining fishing intentions we learnt that the father was taking his two sons to a large pool 10 minutes' walk upstream that was 'full of fish'. We offered to avoid that water, and they decided to go directly there and leave the rest of the river to us.

Brian fished the first 3/4 hour session, and we quickly learned that most of the fish were likely in the 'big pool with the willow lined bank'. Paul was still below the big pool for his 3/4 hour session. He hooked and lost one fish on the dry fly / nymph combo. It took in a blind spot on the water caused by the sun shining through the willows, and so was probably not well hooked.

Brian in his next session missed a strike on a fast run and then headed upstream past the 'big pool, full of fish', where the three anglers were focussing their efforts. The next pool up was very long and on the right-hand side of the riverbed. There were six – ten or so fish feeding in the flat water near the willows in the lower half of the pool. In the limited time left, Brian was not able to elicit a take, and so finished the morning with a blank. Paul then had a go for the same fish, and had two fish rise to the dry, but failed to successfully hook up. Further up there was a deeper pocket of water near a downed tree, with two fish visible down deep. Paul switched to euronymphing to get down deep to the fish. He failed to get a strike from the bigger fish but did pick up one small fish at 24cm long. A last frantic effort towards the top of the pool failed to add to the score, so the morning ended with Paul having one small fish.

Back at Gladstone we learned that Jarek had better luck. He and Rod fished upstream from the Dakins Road picnic area. Jarek had landed two fish, 20 cm and 41 cm. Rod had hooked into a fish but unfortunately missed out on landing it. So the morning session was Jarek 1 st, Paul 2 nd, and Brian and Rod 4 th equal.

Fortunately for the afternoon session we had decided to fish fresh

water. Jarek and Brian drew downstream from the Gladstone Bridge, and Paul and Rod downstream from Wardell's Bridge.

Jarek maintained his consistency by landing two fish, 36 cm and 21 cm, and quite reasonably may have hoped to be in the running for the trophy.



Brian had a much better afternoon and landed five fish averaging 32 cm.

Paul had the first session at Wardell's and opted to start fishing with two wee wets on a nymph tip line. He was quickly into action with small fish hitting the flies regularly. In the first session he landed seven fish up to 30 cm, and almost as many that were under the size limit of 18 cm.

Rod stayed with dry fly / nymph combo in his session, and picked up two fish, 19 and 25 cm, when he allowed the nymph to swing around below him in wet fly fashion.

In his second session Paul continued down the shallow run from where Rod had finished, but apart from one 18 cm fish, anything else he caught there was undersize. To finish the session, he headed down to the confluence with the Waingawa River. There was a deep gut where the rivers joined, and after a few casts on the high bank on the left side of the river with a euro-nymph rig and dropping one fish, crossed the middle of the pool at waist depth to access the water from the RHS. Rod also crossed with the measuring board in hand. Being somewhat shorter, that was not easy. The effort was worthwhile however, with Paul landing another three fish; 33, 28 and 46 cm, in the last 15 minutes of his session.

Rod wasn't able to land another fish in his final session.

In the final tally, Paul had the win with a 2nd & 1st placing, Jarek second with a 1st and 3rd, and Brian third with his 2nd placing in the afternoon. Everyone enjoyed the day's outing, and for now, we know where to go...to the big pool, full of fish.





UPCOMING CLUB TRIPS

ONSTREAM DAY – RUAMAHUNGA RIVER

The three of us who visited the Ruamahunga River for onstream day, enjoyed a beautiful sunny days fishing.







Rain overnight had failed to have any effect on water levels and we found the river low and clear. A cool morning also meant there was very little feeding activity. However Jarrad and David were successful with a few fish (see photo)

By lunchtime however a hatch of mayflies really got a significant numbers of small rainbows feeding actively with approximately 30 landed but regrettably none even made the 1lb. These would have been good catches for the Club Champs held two weeks prior but it was disappointing that few significant fish in terms of size were caught on the day.

Nevertheless an enjoyable days fishing.

Topics covered will include three essential fly fishing knots, three basic leader set-ups, introduction to fly lines and essential fly patterns.

Body	Glow-Bug yarn – preferably stretchy yarn Various colour combinations including; champagne, fire orange, fluorescent orange, flame, deep dark red
